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Bahamian pets need adoption following Hurricane Dorian

The Animal Welfare League of Charlotte County is a local animal rescue organization that is committed to providing relief services to animals in the Bahamas affected by Hurricane Dorian. With relief efforts now underway in Nassau, the Bahamas Humane Society is in desperate need to empty its shelter to make way for those animals requiring immediate assistance on their devastated islands.

AWL is working collaboratively with twelve other member organizations of the Florida Association of Animal Welfare Organizations to facilitate the transport of nearly 100 dogs and 70 cats from the storm-ravaged areas. The Bahamas Humane Society is currently preparing animals for transport to various animal shelters and rescue organizations throughout the state of Florida, with up to 60 dogs and cats scheduled to arrive in Charlotte, Sarasota and Manatee counties.

Per guidelines and best practices set by the University of Florida's Maddie's Shelter Medicine Program, all animals entering their respective shelter will be quarantined for a minimum of two weeks, as many of the island animals could have illnesses contagious to other animals or humans. Once released from quarantine, the rescued dogs and cats will be available for adoption. At this time, little is known about the age, demeanor or health of the animals to be received.

15% for the citywide seawall project, previously awarded at 75 percent of eligible costs.

Funding for this Public Assistance project is authorized under Sections 403 of the Robert T. Stafford Act, reimbursing eligible applicants for the cost of debris removal; life-saving emergency protective measures; and the repair, replacement or restoration of disaster-damaged facilities like buildings, roads and utilities.

However, according to Punta Gorda Mayor Nancy Prafke's weekly e-newsletter: "What isn't mentioned is that the state of Florida's share will be reduced from 12.5% to 5%. This will be a \$2.1 million decrease on the state side. The net amount the city will expect to receive due to this change is approximately \$2.1 million. The good news is that the city portion is also reduced to 5%."

FEMA's PA grant program is an essential source of funding for communities recovering from a federally declared disaster or emergency. Florida Division of Emergency Management works with FEMA during all phases of the PA program and conducts final reviews of FEMA-approved projects. Applicants work directly with FEMA to develop project worksheets and scopes of work. Following approvals by FEMA and the FDEM, FEMA obligates funding for the project.

FEMA's Public Assistance program provides grants to state, tribal, and local governments, and certain types of private non-profit organizations including some houses of worship, so that communities can quickly respond to and recover from major disasters or emergencies.



The federal share for Public Assistance projects is not less than 75% of the eligible cost. The state determines how the non-federal share of the cost of a project (up to 25%) is split with the sub-recipients such as local and county governments.
